Maybe I am a bit jaded, but I think honesty is a quality that is becoming harder and harder to find in our culture these days. What is more upsetting is that it seems like we are becoming more accustomed to dishonesty and less likely to confront it. Five minutes of any local or national news program demonstrates this point precisely. World leaders are not admitting to mistakes they have made or flat out lying to their constituents in order to get a vote, entire collegiate teams being punished for rampant academic cheating

among their players or teams being placed on probation for recruiting violations. Instead of demanding truth from politicians, we actually expect them to be dishonest and we seem to have gotten comfortable with the "win at all costs" mentality when it is our team. However, we cannot ignore the fact that our gradual acceptance of dishonesty is affecting and will affect our children. I know you may be thinking, "Well, I don't accept lying in my household," which is probably true for most families. But since we are talking about honesty, and being honest, let me ask you; do you think cheating is a big deal? For us as adults, cheating can be a litany of major things from cheating on your spouse to cheating

A few years ago, I was walking out of the grocery store one evening with my sons. At the time they were probably about 11 and 7 years old. As we were placing our bags in the back of my car, I discovered an avocado that had slipped underneath my reusable shopping bags that I had forgotten to give to the clerk when we were checking out. (I tend to forget my bags often—even when I actually do take them into the store!) My oldest son said, "Oh no, Mom, we didn't pay for that!" In that moment, after a hectic day at work, and a frantic race to the store to figure out something to have for dinner, standing at the back of my car, in the middle of the rain, I had a decision to make. Of course, I seriously considered just throwing the avocado in the car and getting home before the rain turned into snow, but I realized not only was my older son looking at me wondering what I would do, but the big brown eyes of his little brother were fixed on the

rock hard avocado that I really needed for guacamole that night! Suddenly those big eyes were looking at me...ARGH!!! I just wanted to get home! However, I knew what I had to do. The three of us raced back into store, jumping over



puddles and avoiding other shoppers exiting the doors. When we reached the service desk, the manager seemed quite surprised that we had come all the way back into the store to pay for one lonely, unripe avocado. Honestly, so was I! And honestly, I was wondering to myself if I would have gone back into the store if my sons had not been with me. But then I thought, doing the right thing should not depend upon whether anyone is looking; we do the right thing because it is the right thing to do, and our soul knows it! I wanted to set an example for my kids that night. I hoped that the choice we made to return to pay for our avocado would stick with them when they were faced with choices, choices where doing the right thing might not always be convenient. I hoped that it would somehow transcend through the years to remind them that they should admit when they did not do their homework, instead of trying to copy a friend's right before class. I hoped it would remind them to do the right thing and accept whatever grade they got on a test based on their own effort, and not try and cheat somehow just to get a higher percentage. And of course I truly hoped it would remind them to do the right thing when faced with much bigger "adult" choices!

My boys are now 14 and 11, and I honestly cannot say that they are 100% truthful all of the time. But I like



to think that myself, my husband, and the other adults in their lives are doing everything we can to encourage them to be young men of integrity, not only by what we say, but by how we live our lives. Our children need to know that being honest and doing the right thing will get them further in life than any grade on any test or assignment ever will. If we teach them to be honest and truthful

with things as small as an avocado, we can hope that they will recognize and pursue truth in the big decisions of their lives.

TCA Marching Band Takes Third at State

This year the TCA marching band threw their hat into the ring of competitive marching band and had a tremendously successful season. Beginning with sectional rehearsals over the summer, full band camp the first week of August, and 4-6 hours weekly in the evenings and on Saturdays, staff and students created and crafted their 2015 show, "Phoenix Rising" by Gary Gilroy. The music is the story of the phoenix, a bird on fire that incinerates itself and then is reborn from its ashes.



The marching band competed on October 10th at the Legend Band festival winning first in their division. They then performed again at the Colorado Bandmasters Southern Regional completion (our state

qualifier competition) October 14th at D20 stadium. They also placed first at that event and as a result secured a state competition spot, which took place on October 26th at the CSU Pueblo Thunderbowl. Our band was able to perform twice. advancing semifinals to finals, where they finished third in the state in their FIRST year competing! TCA Obtains Kinder Readiness Waiver

Over the summer TCA started the process to submit for a waiver to the Kindergarten Readiness (School Readiness) portion of the Colorado Achievement Plan for Kids (CAP4K) legislation that was passed in 2008. Last school year (2014-2015), TCA, along with other schools within Academy District 20, entered into a pilot program for assessing Kinder Readiness in compliance with state statute. The state approved assessment protocol was Teaching Strategies GOLD (TS GOLD). After participating in the pilot program last year TCA felt that our own system of evaluating kindergartners met the requirements of the law in a manner far more suited to our pedagogical approach and community desires. Once the opportunity for submitting a waiver to the mandate was offered by the Colorado State Board of Education, TCA worked diligently to capture how the

program and assessments we have in place met the requirements of the state statute. At the September 2015 meeting of the Colorado State



Board of Education our waiver was reviewed and approved through June 2038. Academy School District 20 followed with a similar waiver request the next month, which was also approved by the state board (the largest school district in Colorado to acquire such a waiver). TCA is thrilled to have obtained this waiver which reduces an intrusive burden on our kindergarten teachers with no evident benefit over previous practice. The waiver process gave TCA, other charter schools, and some districts that have sought relief, an element of local control that our board, administrators, and others have promoted over the past few years. For this school year, and into the future at TCA, the readiness of our kindergarten students for first grade will be assessed in a manner consistent with TCA values.



CLASSROOM VISITS




BEYOND THE BOOK CLUB


