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
National Student Academic Awards

The AP Program offers several AP Scholar Awards to recognize high school students who have **demonstrated college-level achievement through AP courses and exams**. Although there is no monetary award, in addition to receiving an award certificate, this achievement is acknowledged on any score report that is sent to colleges the following fall.

AP Scholar: Granted to students who receive scores of 3 or higher on three or more AP Exams

The National Merit® Scholarship Program is an academic competition for recognition and scholarships that began in 1955. High school students enter the National Merit Program by taking the Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT®)—a test which serves as an initial screen of approximately 1.5 million entrants each year—and by meeting published program entry/participation requirements. In February, some 15,000 Semifinalists are notified by mail at their home addresses that they have advanced to Finalist standing. High school principals are notified and provided with a certificate to present to each Finalist.

Regional Science Fair Results

2016 Pikes Peak Regional Science Fair

On February 27, 2016, at UCCS, 41 TCA students (twenty-three 7th graders, sixteen 8th graders, and two high school students) competed at the **2016 Pikes Peak Regional Science Fair**. The Classical Academy dominated with numerous awards given. Specifically, 7th grade won 53% of the category awards for their division and the 8th grade won 45%. The prizes ranged from \$15 to \$250. Approximately \$2,000 in cash prizes was won, along with other awards. Mr. Caruana and Mrs. Muir are extremely proud of the students that competed at regionals. Eleven junior high students and the two high school students moved on to represent TCA at the Colorado Science and Engineering Fair in April.

State Science Fair Results

On April 7-9, 2016, student finalists from all corners of our state converged at Colorado State University to compete in the 61st Colorado Science and Engineering Fair. TCA had 12 projects represented by 13 students. Eight of the thirteen students received recognition in their respective category. First place was \$200, 2nd place was \$100, 3rd was \$75, 4th was \$50, and honorable mention was a certificate. Eighteen special awards were given.

Courage - The Muscle of the Soul

They crept across the damp soil and fallen logs of the dense forest. Exhausted and famished beyond belief, they pressed on for yet another night under the cover of darkness. Facing another formidable obstacle, a silent signal passed among them to unite. The veterans, in self-sacrifice, hoisted comrades onward and upward to advance the mission of the troop while they lingered behind in their final resting place.

Is this scenario an excerpt depicting the fortitude and trials of Lee's army in the Civil War from *April 1865* (discussed most recently in Wes Jolly's *Beyond the Book Club*)? Or could the scenario be a demonstration of self-sacrifice found in nature, in the life of a colony of Dictyostelium single celled organisms?


If you guessed both, you are correct! John Tyler Bonner, a 95 year-old professor emeritus at Princeton University, has studied the self-sacrificing behavior of Dictyostelium amoeba-like organisms for more than 70 years. He reports that the single celled organisms will send one another a chemical signal uniting individuals into a colony "slime mold" where some will give their lives to form a stalk from which to launch the others to more

favorable conditions for the good of the whole. (Please realize, that after nearly a decade of having loved teaching *Life Science* for our TCA High Schools at both North and more recently College, Pathways, I might tend to "go a little Biology" on you!)

The major difference in the bravery and fortitude expressed by Lee's army in the final days of the Civil War and the sacrificing nature of the Dictyostelium amoeba creatures is that the slime mold's action is inherent for

survival. Courage in humans, unlike brown eyes or attached earlobes, is not a quality one is either born with or without. Courage is a choice. Courage is a muscle of the soul: the mind, will, and emotions that can be chosen and cultivated. The more courage is exercised, the more growth and resilience occurs. Exercising courage helps us acquire the needed proficiency to face life's unavoidable challenges and become empowered to contend with problems and difficulties head-on.

I recently had the privilege of attending a special presentation on "Heroes" given by Dr. Coulter for our TCA Cottage School Program (CSP) in Mandy Fernihough's class, where he shared with the 5th graders about the various types of courage. Among them, he spoke of physical courage, moral courage, and intellectual courage.

To elaborate on the most familiar; physical courage or bravery is exhibited in the face of physical pain, hardship, death, or threat of death. I'd like to share this story to illustrate. It was a typical Saturday morning which included a routine grocery run. Within the store a scream was heard from an elderly lady. People fled, yet one rushed to the rescue from the back of the store. Bob Wise, College Pathways (CP) *Computer and Personal Finance* teacher, intuitively assessed the situation, and angled toward the attacker who had stolen not only the lady's

purse, but within it, her means of acquiring sustenance, her security with address and house key inside, and her identity of more than 70 years. Bob grasped the attacker's collar, and though decades his senior, used former ju-jitsu training to wrestle the would-be thief to the ground, restraining him in a full nelson for more than seven minutes until police arrived. VIAcharacter.org defines this kind of "courage and bravery as strength that may manifest inwardly or outwardly composed of cognitions, emotions, motivations and decisions." Reacting in courage was already at the core of Bob's being in a culmination of right choices and a lifetime of inputs of virtuous values. There was no time to ponder such questions as "Should I do something?" - only the requirement of taking



genuine risk, with prudence. Courage was already present when the need arose to draw upon it.

People of courage take action in a way that is consistent with their values. Many acts of courage are motivated by value and esteem for one another. Author, J.M. Barrie writes, "There are many different kinds of bravery. There's the bravery of thinking of others before one's self." I love that our thirteen-time state champion TCA track team has a motto Coach Tim Daggett has instilled in them in his years of serving as coach. When asked who they run for, jump for, or throw for, our TCA athletes' response in word and action is, "Each Other!"

I saw yet another beautiful example of courage for "Each Other" when I asked Sonja Daum what her 4th grade CSP students might classify as courageous acts. Julia wrote of her mother, Kathy in her Legacy Journal - "My mommy showed courage when she birthed her babies in our home with no pain killers because she loved us and thought it was healthiest for the babies. I weighed over ten pounds". Kathy is about 5'2" and mother of eight! Well identified example of courage, Julia!



Courageous actions may be quiet and thoughtful. "Courage doesn't always roar, sometimes courage is the little voice at the end of the day that says, I'll try again tomorrow" ~Mary Anne Radmacher. This caliber of resolve is seen in Kalvin Blauert, a CP student with an indomitable spirit and a heart of encouragement for everyone he meets. Kalvin has developed an uncommon valor striving to overcome the effects of Muscular Dystrophy during his young fifteen-year life. This recent Spring Break, Kalvin was hospitalized with life threatening complications. He shares his story, "Everything happened quickly and I began to code

(cardiopulmonary arrest happening to a patient, requiring immediate resuscitative efforts) and my

parents asked me what I wanted to do. I said, "I want to keep fighting." Fortunately my heart never stopped because I finally responded to the medicine . . . I have been down this road before. It takes perseverance, courage, and a positive attitude to overcome the challenges I have to face. From an early age I took on the motto "keep on keeping on". I want to be an example to the world to never give up. So once again I am reminded and choosing to persevere through the tough times." After a month in the hospital, Kalvin returned to College Pathways as a victory line of nearly two hundred students welcomed him!

Having been at TCA nearly a decade now, I've been privileged to see former students start their own careers and families, and put feet to dreams. I'm so grateful to be part of this amazing TCA Community where our students hear a united voice from parents and teachers who provide lessons in elementary classes and beyond as recently portrayed when Dr. Coulter shared with CSP students; "We are the "land of the free" first and



foremost because we are "the home of the brave." Followed by the mandate, "Each of us, each of you, has chances every day to be someone of great courage, strong commitment, and virtuous character. Never pass up the opportunity to show courage and be a hero to someone." Seeds like this at school and living examples at home, cultivate beautiful legacies in this rising generation.

As we head into summer, may we be intentional in cultivating the muscle of the soul – courage, in order that we may become the best version of ourselves that we can be. Growing in courage requires choosing to exercise courage. "It takes courage to grow . . . and become who you really are" ~ e. e. cummings.

Here's to who you really are . . . and have a wonderful summer!

FINISHING WELL by Emily Hanenburg, East Elementary

So many of you are very experienced runners who can speak to running and how it applies to life much more profoundly and eloquently than I can. I hope that it is an encouragement. I am blessed to have the privilege to be one of the coaches



for the high school track team for at least a few years. I can take no credit for my understanding or experiences in it. I have run and worked under three, arguably, of the best coaches in the state - and I get to learn from them. Really in the grand scheme of things, my part in any of it is so small. I listen to kids and hug the girls that cry at meets and practice.

One of the things that I really love about running is that it is hard. Many days, you do not want to do it. Without that sounding completely masochistic, I feel like running has taught me how to work hard and that when I train myself to push hard physically while running past the point where I think I can, it makes me just a little tougher to handle the way more challenging things that are in life. Just like teaching, running never stops being hard, you just learn how to handle the difficulty.

In honor of the miles being run in PE this week, I am going to use the mile as an analogy. As I would imagine most of you know, the mile is 4 laps on a track. The tempo of each lap of a track fits very well with the 4 parts of a school year...

Lap one: the gun goes off, everyone runs fast, gets out hard, feels a little overwhelmed by the rush of it, but also energized by it. The second lap is steady, everyone has settled into pace, unremarkable, holding pace and position. The third lap is almost always the slowest lap for runners. It drags on. It is not close enough to the end where you can give a final push (so much so that most people are afraid to push too hard), but still your legs and lungs are burning. And, the fourth lap - the bell lap. It is the time in the race where you want nothing more than to stop. Every part of you does not feel good at all. And yet, it has to be the fastest lap of your race. It is the time where you have to very intentionally choose if you are going to push through the pain of each moment because every second and every inch counts. But, you can do it, because of all of the time you have spent practicing and effort you have already poured into the training and race before this point. Finishing well on the last laps is really important. While it is hard, wearisome and painful, I have never heard of a runner who regretted finishing well. (Although many lament that they had more to give after they finish.)

Especially In the last lap these are a few of the things that we share with our kids before the race and during it:

1. We remind them of the purpose of what they are doing? For our high school track team, the whole mentality is running for each other. Not just the individual competing, but recognizing they are part of something bigger. It is such a gift to work with so many people who are working toward the bigger goal of loving students well, helping them grow to the very end . . . because we want those things to carry with them into the summer, into the next year, into life.

2. Taking great joy and being thankful in the moments. Something I always tell the kids on the track team is that they can only run one lap at a time. So, they need to be intentional and very present in that lap. A race is many steps, many moments. We have thousands of little moments between now and the last day of school, we get to choose the attitude

and mentality that we approach time with.

3. Be tough. Sometimes that is just it. A person just has to dig deeper. Finishing well is a big deal to our head coach. There is that expectation that is how we do things on our team. Athletes prove trustworthy by showing strength, stamina and will at the end of every race.

I am so thankful for all of you - to work alongside you and learn from you as we finish the year. You all do a great job. Have a wonderful last few weeks of finishing well ©. Thank you.


