
CORE VALUES LEAVES & FRUIT

As we look at the final two sections of the Core Values, we find two very different parts of the tree – the leaves and the fruit. Each with a very different function.

Looking through the statements in the leaves section, we find many statements about things that we do at TCA that are not directly related to what happens in the classroom during the school day. These statements are instead, ways in which we live out our philosophy outside of the classroom. Think about a tree in the winter when there are no leaves. The tree is still alive and functioning, but it appears to be incomplete. When the leaves fill in during the spring and early summer, we see a tree that appears to be full and complete without any gaps. This same thing is true of our TCA tree. As we follow through with these commitments, our tree becomes full and complete without gaps or holes.

As we move on to the fruit, it is important to notice that most of what we find in this section is also found, in many cases word for word, in the roots section. This is not a coincidence. The fruit of a tree is the only part of the tree designed to fall off or leave the tree. The seeds in the fruit carry the same DNA as the roots. When the fruit falls off the tree, its purpose is to carry on the DNA of the parent tree to wherever that fruit ends up. When our students graduate and leave TCA they carry on the "DNA" they received here. The only way to ensure that they leave the tree as the certain kind of persons we want them to be is for us to be that same kind of person - to live out our Core Values on a daily basis. Look at the characteristics of TCA fruit (in this link to the Core Values). We need to express the Core Values DNA in such a way that our students leave here as the kind of exemplary citizens that we want them to be.


IN THE SPOTLIGHT:

For the 2018-2019 school year, the following books will be discussed (*prospective book study dates are listed below*):










Appreciation of Beauty and Excellence: A Lasting Legacy

As I contemplate the meaning of the word "legacy", I have a renewed appreciation for beauty and excellence found in everyday life. The human tendency to feel powerful self-transcendent emotions has been studied since ancient times. One of these transcendent emotions is an appreciation of beauty and excellence, which refers to the ability to find and take pleasure in the existence of goodness (Peterson & Seligman, 2004). Appreciation is associated with certain behaviors such as awe, wonder, goose bumps, tears, and the desire to improve oneself and contribute to the greater good of others (Keltner & Haidt, 2003). Even though there are multiple ways for people to connect with the excellence and beauty around them, it happened for me as I began to contemplate the lasting legacy left for me.

Legacy defined by the Merriam-Webster dictionary means. . .

- gift by will especially of money or other personal property;
- something transmitted by or received from an ancestor or predecessor or from the past.

A lasting legacy refers to something that is permanent or enduring that is handed down, endowed or conveyed from one person to another.

My quest for more information about my ancestry led to the discovery of an obituary written for my great-great-grandmother, Lavina Valentine Davis. The power of the incredible legacy left by this humble woman was clearly articulated in her obituary in the local Nebraska newspaper.

Lavina V. Dodds was born in Danville, Iowa, February 14, 1860, and died at the age of 71 years, 11 months old. Her girlhood days were spent near Danville where she married John Wesley Davis on January 3, 1877. Nine children were born to them, six of whom survive. Two infants and a daughter, Grace, preceded her to her heavenly home. Mrs. Davis was converted in early life and fully consecrated her life to Christian service, assisting her husband in the many duties of a minister's

IT BROUGH SUCH JOY TO OUR EARS TO HEAR THAT BABY CRY NON-STOP FOR THE NEXT COUPLE OF DAYS.

The power of the incredible legacy left by my nephew was clearly articulated in the obituary I contributed to for his Celebration of Life service this last summer.

Benjamin Michael Hess was embraced by his Savior on July 27, 2017. He was the beloved second son of David and Marcia Hess. His beloved siblings at home are Matthew, Jacob, Abigail, Grace, and Mark. He has four grandparents, 16 aunts and uncles, and 32 cousins. His heartwarming smile, contagious belly laugh, and generous heart are just a few things everyone vividly remembers about Ben. He loved his friends and greatly enjoyed being part of a huge family. He was extremely loyal and encouraging. Ben spent much time exploring the outdoors, was naturally curious and had plans to become a beekeeper. He was a proud, amazing "2nd" big brother who always had a protective eye on his younger siblings. Ben had a strong relationship with his Jesus, deeply impacting those around him as a shining light for Christ. He felt most comfortable without shoes walking around his property looking for snakes or digging for gold. His family will most miss his smile and hugs every morning.

Even though July 27, 2017 was truly a bittersweet day in the life of our family, Ben's legacy continues. Even at his young age, he had made a significant impact on the lives of many people in his community. He started an annual community-wide fire prevention training. The beekeeping company he was training with offered to start a scholarship in his name. A well-known store that Ben often visited contacted my sister and brother-in-law about writing a story in their publication about his life. Just to clarify, this day was bittersweet because my nephew experienced Sudden Unexplainable Nocturnal Death Syndrome (SUNDS) - that was the bitter part; but just as powerful was the sweet part that we had 12 beautiful years with this incredible young man.

It is essential for each of us to consider what type of legacy we are leaving for others. Whether we are given the gift of time to live a long life or not, it is our responsibility to steward the time we have been given and invest our lives wisely. Sometimes, as in the case of my nephew Benjamin, we experience altered legacy. Altered legacy occurs when someone experiences sickness, divorce, death, or any type of unexpected loss. At some point in life most of us will deal with altered legacy, but it is possible to find hope and restoration. Let us live a life that outlives us! As we pursue beauty and excellence, let us make the most of every moment, live with no regrets, and leave a lasting legacy for others.


National Student Academic Awards: National Merit & AP

The AP Program offers several AP Scholar Awards to recognize high school students who have demonstrated college-level achievement through AP courses and exams. Although there is no monetary award, in addition to receiving an award certificate, this achievement is acknowledged on any score report that is sent to colleges the following fall.

AP Scholar: Granted to students who receive scores of 3 or higher on three or more AP exams.

AP Scholar with Honor: Granted to students who receive an average score of at least 3.25 on all AP exams taken, and scores of 3 or higher on four or more of these exams.

AP Scholar with Distinction: Granted to students who receive an average score of 3.5 on all AP exams taken, and scores of 3 or higher on five or more of these exams.

The National Merit® Scholarship Program is an academic competition for recognition and scholarships that began in 1955. High school students enter the National Merit Program by taking the Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT®)—a test which serves as an initial screen of approximately 1.5 million entrants each year—and by meeting published program entry/participation requirements. In February, some 15,000 Semifinalists are notified by mail at their home addresses that they have advanced to Finalist standing. High school principals are notified and provided with a certificate to present to each Finalist.

2018 Pikes Peak Regional Science Fair

On February 24th at UCCS, thirty-nine 7th graders, twenty-five 8th graders, and 1 high school student competed at the **2018 Pikes Peak Regional Science Fair**. The Classical Academy dominated with numerous awards given. Specifically, junior high students won 32/37 of the category awards (87%), and TCA junior high swept 5/9 of the categories. The prizes ranged from \$15 to \$300 with first place worth \$100. TCA students were awarded approximately \$3,000 in cash and prizes. Twenty-eight junior high students and one high school student will represent TCA at the Colorado Science and Engineering Fair in April competing for bragging rights and cash prizes.


