

SPECIAL GUEST: RICHARD WEISSBOURD

In May 2022, I had the opportunity to interview TCA's three former Directors of Character: **Dr. Russ Sojourner, Ruth Miller**, and **Betsy Brown**. Over the course of the next few PALMARIUM volumes we will share portions of the interview transcripts to provide some insight into the development of our Character efforts at TCA over the past 25 years. The questions below will be listed in blue followed by the individual answers.

W. Jolly: During your tenure as Director of Character Education, what was your biggest challenge, and what was your biggest accomplishment?

B. Brown: We needed a few more resources and that was one thing we had to work through. The other thing I think, was just a common language for a K-I2 scope and sequence on character. I feel like we had a lot of people who were passionate about character and we had a lot of different language being used. What might be talked about in kindergarten would be something completely different than in high school.

And so I really felt that was a big challenge that I wanted to tackle—was this common language [we eventually choose VIA Character Strengths]—plus we needed to get a scope and sequence.

I also felt like, the idea of having the character outside of the integration under the schools became a point of contention sometimes. Because you had this stand-alone group, who would be saying, "Here is what we want to do..." The agency and autonomy that principals inherently need to have, to do their jobs well, sometimes I felt like that could be a "rub" there.

We worked through it all beautifully, but it did create some friction. And so, that was definitely some of the challenge. Accomplishment? I would say the **Titan's Creed**. Because when that rock went up, that was the "Okay. I am done here" moment. I have done my work.

Also, I would say, you know, when we did the mission statement—I was passionate about the mission statement and I still love the mission statement—it is focused on one group of stakeholders, which is the parents. Which is an important group of stakeholders and there are a lot of other stakeholders in this school. You have the students. You have the parents. You have the staff. You have the administration. You have just everybody that comes into contact with [our school]...and the community. So this idea that a mission statement that was really focused on one group, I was really passionate about including all voices.

The process took eight months basically, start to finish. We had all stakeholders involved in that process. So watching it evolve...I might have had one thought about how this thing was going to look and it ended up being a very different, but much more comprehensive, amazing statement about who we are as a school. So, that would be it for sure

R. Sojourner: I will reiterate what has already been said. A real challenge is what does character inculcation look like for kindergarteners is quite different than what it looks like for 12th graders. When

you're sitting in that seat trying to figure out activities or conversations for those two levels, it is a challenge.

I mentioned in my time at the Air Force Academy, it is one thing to have a different conversation for I8-year-olds, verses 22-year-olds. It is an entirely



different one when we are talking about 5-year-olds verses 18-year-olds. That was a big challenge.

A victory, also, stories that Ruth will tell about kids who remember Titan team, remember what it meant to them...that is a victory. Betsy mentioned, "When you say at your school we put as much time into moral development of kids as much as the intellectual development," that is a concept that people just do not understand in education.

I am really proud that we together, collectively us three, plus Wes Jolly as a history teacher, plus our Director of Academic Services, and all the rest of our staff here. That is something that is remarkably different than what most schools experience. And that, is a great victory.

R. Miller: And if I can piggy-back on that Russ, the one thing that I have said again and again, and again, and I always paraphrase it, but Teddy Roosevelt's quote, "To educate a man in mind and not in morals is to educate a menace to society." I feel like schools do a disservice to our society when we make people smart, but don't encourage the moral component underneath that.

W. Jolly: Ruth, what was your biggest accomplishment?

R. Miller: I look at the products of what came out of our efforts with students. And rather than looking at a specific program or something that we did (which there were multiple things that we feel very good about), I would have to say it would be looking at the results and that would be the students. Here are two examples.

Fifteen years out, I went into a restaurant with my husband and here walks up one of my Titan Team members. And he hugs me. He doesn't take my order. He sits down next to me in the booth. And he starts to tell me about his master's degree, his girlfriend, and his current challenges in life. I mean, that was the foundation that we laid in Titan Teams - is to have that open door, and he still, 15 years later, felt that

Second example: is the kiosk at *Loaf and Jug*. The little kiosk around the gas pump and a person sits in there? I'm filling up my car and the door opens, which never opens. You don't even know someone is in there. Here comes a person. It is one of my Titan Team members.

A little background: when we created the Titan Team lists for Jr. High and High School, I put them all in the cafeteria up on the wall. I put ten kids in each one. And remember this Russ? I would have our teachers go in and walk around and find the kids that they connected with, kids they already had relationships with. They would take the list and bring it to me and that would be their team.

So, [here we are] sitting down in a restaurant receiving hugs while a former student wants to engage [with us]. And the other gentleman who walked out of the kiosk at the gas pump, and he gave me a hug and told me about his life. So I consider that a success.

B. Brown: That's awesome.


R. Sojourner: That's a great story.

B. Brown: Yeah, the Titan Teams...that was a brilliant, brilliant piece of the character effort...

R. Miller: Everyone has eyes on someone. Nobody, at least, in Russ' terms, he said, is "Invisible." "Nobody is invisible."

B. Brown: I love that.


