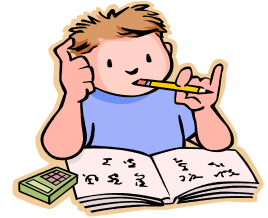

1. OPR & WPR – review phonograms orally and complete a written review every day. Please complete the written phonogram quiz on Day 4. The lines are for the test are located in the daily language packet.

We will begin filling in our spelling words in our spelling notebooks next week. Then, the teacher at home will administer a Spelling test each week.

Today, the students took a Morrison McCall spelling assessment, and we began to individually assess students to determine their phonemic awareness.

Please review the definitions for

noun - person, place, or thing

Verb - action word

vowel - a, e, i, o, u, and sometimes y in English

consonant - a speech sound that is not a vowel (21 letters in the alphabet).
